Short Description

This course deals with the relationship between cinema and philosophy and how they relate to shared problems. By analyzing how philosophers understood different aspects of the cinematic experience, such as the status of the cinematic image, the structure of points of view, and the nature of cinematic temporality, the course examines the potentiality of cinema to shed light on philosophical issues, such as the relationship between the viewer and the viewed, the problems of solipsism and skepticism, and questions concerning the notion of representation.

Why has philosophy been hostile to films? How can films and philosophy be related? How do they respond to shared problems?
