<b>Short Description</b>	
<p>Climate collapse is the greatest challenge of the twenty-first century and we have entered it with a mindset forged in the nineteenth. This is one reason why approaching this global crisis from a historical perspective is so insightful. Attending specifically to the Middle East, where environmental collapse happens at a faster rate than the global average, allows focusing on a “hot spot” both in terms of temperatures and in terms of the conflicts they exacerbate. The course will examine the history of climate change from the early nineteenth century until today, looking at relevant cases from The Arabian Peninsula, Egypt, and Israel-Palestine among other settings.</p>	
<b>Final grade components</b>	
<p><b>Minor assignments:</b> Short oral presentations of the weekly reading materials, active class participation (11% of final grade)</p> <p><b>Midterm:</b> 5-page essay (19% of final grade)</p> <p><b>Final requirement:</b> 7,000-10,000 words research paper (70% of final grade). Submission dates are set by the university and the Liberal Arts program and extension requests can only be granted by the program’s academic committee.</p>	
<b>Attendance</b>	
Attendance is mandatory. Students are permitted a maximum of three absences without penalty. Any additional absences will affect the final grade and may result in failure of the course.
